

How are you assessed? Just make me impressed!

Your enthusiasm for the class and all things Japan will certainly help your grade. The rest of the assessments will be largely project-based (see some examples below), coupled with a handful of review checks.

Japanese Culture and Society: Students create a weekend news show covering various current events on a given weekend in Japan - with commercials! History/Geography: Students create a Travel blog or Travel Itinerary or create Travel Service business. Anime/Entertainment: Students write a film review or students write a storyboard for a sequel. Sports/Entertainment: Students plan an Entertainment Guide for a particular week/month Literature Assessment: Students craft a short story or book of poems.
